Military retiree pay dates to change

Paydays for military retirees and those who receive portions of retired pay are changing for December, as the Defense Finance and Accounting Service (DFAS) changes its pay schedule to comply with the 2011 National Defense Authorization Act.

This year payments normally scheduled for Jan. 3, 2012, will be issued on Dec. 30, 2011. For the calendar year 2011, this

means military retirees will receive 13 rather than the normal 12 payments. Customers should speak with a tax advisor, the Internal Revenue Service or their state tax authority to determine if their tax withholding will satisfy federal and state income taxes when they file returns next year.

SSN removal from ID cards update

DoD is in the process of eliminating the Social Security Number (SSN) from DoD ID cards. The following key messages and themes will be part of all communications efforts relating to SSN reduction.

1. The SSN will no longer be visible on the cards and should not be relied on for individual authentication.

2. These changes are being made by the department to protect the identity information of the card holders.

3. The removal of SSNs will occur in three phase, all of which will be implemented as part of the normal card lifecycle process:

Phase one, already in progress, will remove the printed dependent SSN from Dependent Identification and Privilege cards (DD Forms 1173 and 1173-1) and replace it with the "xxx-xx-xxxx." At this point, the sponsor's SSN will remain visible on the card.

Phase two will remove printed SSNs from all DoD ID cards. The SSN will be replaced by a

DoD Identification Number which will appear on all DoD ID cards. Additionally, a "DoD Benefits Number" will be printed only on those ID cards that convey benefits. This phase will begin by the end of May 2011.

Phase three will remove SSNs from barcodes on all cards and is scheduled to begin during calendar year 2012.

Individuals will receive a new card upon expiration of the current card. ID cards issuance facilities are currently issuing DoD cards without SSN appearing on the card. Current ID cards should not be replaced until the card is within 30 days of its expiration date. ID card holders whose ID Card has an INDEF expiration date and wishes their SSN to be removed may do so at any time.

NOTE: Tricare beneficiaries should make sure they have their Social Security Number committed to memory. It won't be found on the new DoD ID cards.

Scott Air Force Base, Ill.—St. Louis, Missouri native, retired Senior Master Sergeant John A. (Jack) Argent was recently honored as the “Scott AFB Retiree Activities Office 2010 Volunteer of the Year” acknowledged by the United States Air Force Retiree Council’s “Certificate of Appreciation” in recognition of his dedicated service to the United States Air Force.

This high honor was bestowed by the Co-chairmen of the Air Force Retiree Council, Rodney J. McKinley, Chief Master Sergeant of the Air Force, Retired, and Steven R. Polk, Lt. General, USAF, Retired. This acknowledgement of retired SMSgt Argent’s body of outstanding volunteer work took place at the recent 26th Annual Retiree Appreciation Day held September 24, 2011 as part of Scott AFB’s continuing, proud and storied military tradition of honoring our Nations military retirees. As the installation commander and event host, Colonel Michael J. Hornitschek, Commander, 375th Air Mobility Wing stated that since his arrival twelve years ago as a volunteer, SMSgt Argent brings refreshing and added luster and gives new meaning to the word “volunteerism.” He truly personifies the very best in his expression to willingly undertake any service, provide any assistance, and do whatever it takes or is necessary for God and Country, the United States Military, veterans, his fellow retirees and families, and his community. SMSgt Argent splits his volunteer duties as Retiree Service Officer with three organizations. He is the Eastern District Representative with the Missouri National Guard where he serves at Jefferson Barracks (ANG) Base, St. Louis, Missouri, the 375th Air Mobility Wing’s Scott AFB Retiree Activities Office (RAO), and with the 375th Air Mobility Wing’s Satellite RAO, also located at Jefferson Barracks (ANG), Base. His volunteer duties and responsibilities at Scott AFB include, but

are not limited to, assisting the Director and Deputy Director, Scott AFB RAO with the leadership, administration and management of the Scott RAO business activities, program operations and the Scott AFB Retiree Activities Council. SMSgt Argent assists retirees and family members of all branches of the uniformed services with information, counseling, services and referrals on retiree benefits, casualty assistance, TRICARE information and assistance entitlements and programs, on-base functions and services, events and base facilities. He also functions as liaison on behalf of the Scott AFB RAO Director and Deputy and assists on program awareness and business operations improvements; and performs other duties as required or directed by the program director. SMSgt John A. (Jack) Argent was born February 17, 1939, in Saint Louis, Missouri. He attended St. Stephens Catholic Parochial School, St. Mary’s Senior High School, and later attended St. Louis University. SMSgt Argent later joined the Missouri Air National Guard in January 1957 to meet his military commitment to serve his Country. Upon return to civilian life he took a job on the city order desk at Service Blueprint Co. After a few years, he was promoted to an outside salesman covering the southern part of the city. After a few years, he went into home remodeling and construction with a family member. In 1962 SMSgt Argent went back to the blueprint business working for Bell & Howell selling blueprint machines as their specialist, additionally he sold copiers and duplicators to the United States Army. Two years later, he again went in business for himself and founded the company that is now called Quality Reprographics Inc. selling products and blueprints to Architects, Engineers, Surveyors, and Industry. During this time SMSgt Argent had progressed rapidly in rank while in the Air National Guard and had attained the senior rank of “Master Sergeant.” As such he thoroughly enjoyed his job as Noncommissioned Officer in Charge of the Wire Section in the GEEIA squadron. the civilian side, his business was growing and thriving. On the military side he received a “presidential commission” and promoted to the rank of “second lieutenant.” By 1970 however, the pressures of an expanding business and educational requirements placed on the military, compelled SMSgt Argent to resign his commission and returned to the enlisted ranks. In the following years, he served in many positions of importance as a “guardsman” with many deployments, awards and decorations and achieved the top rank of “Senior Master Sergeant.” In October of 1985, SMSgt Argent retired honorably from the United States Air Force. He then devoted all his time to the reproduction business which was evolving and expanding as the result of the “high tech era” experienced throughout the Nation. In 1995 he decided to sell his thriving reprographics business to his employees and turned out to be a very lucrative manner to dispose of the company. By January of 1996, SMSgt Argent was retired from military and private service. Later-on and feeling the call to still serve

his Country, SMSgt Argent volunteer to be a Retiree Service Officer with the 375th Air Mobility Wing’s Scott AFB RAO. Thereafter, the 375th Air Mobility Wing opened a Satellite RAO located at Jefferson Barracks (ANG), Base where he volunteered to serve and still does. This vital Satellite RAO serves both the Army and Air guardsmen. Later in 2008, the Missouri National Guard established a Retirement Services program. The program was divided into seven geographical districts with three council representatives from each district. In 2011, SMSgt Argent was selected to be a representative in the Eastern district. The 375th Air Mobility Wing Satellite RAO located at Jefferson Barracks represents the bulk of the Air participation in the council. SMSgt Argent is married to the former Kathleen (Kathy) Stein of St. Louis, Missouri. They have four daughters and one son, Michelle, Stephanie, Annette, Suzanne, and Thomas. SMSgt Argent and his wife reside in St. Louis County Concord Village, Missouri and are devote and active members of St. Simon the Apostle Church.

The 375th AMW legal office would like to remind retirees that we have walk-in legal assistance on Tuesdays and Wednesdays from 0830-1000 and Thursdays from 1300-1430 if they need to speak to an attorney. If members need a will, healthcare power of attorney, living will or durable power of attorney for finances, they can complete their worksheets online at <https://aflegalassistance.law.af.mil/lass/lass.html>. They can call our office with their ticket code after they complete the worksheets online. This will allow us to pre-draft their documents before they arrive for legal assistance. If they call us with their ticket code, they are encouraged to call prior to coming in for legal assistance to ensure their documents are drafted. TRICARE directs SAIC to offer credit monitoring after data theft

The TRICARE Management Activity recently directed Science Applications International Corporation to provide credit monitoring services for up to 4.9 million beneficiaries whose health information was stored on backup computer tapes stolen from an SAIC employee's car in San Antonio. The move reversed a stance TRICARE has maintained for more than six weeks. In its original announcement of the mid-September theft, TRICARE downplayed the potential vulnerability resulting from what it called a data breach.

"The risk of harm to patients is judged to be low despite the data elements involved since retrieving the data on the tapes would require knowledge of and access to specific hardware and software and knowledge of the system and data structure."

In September, TRICARE did not offer credit monitoring, instead urging beneficiaries "to take steps to protect their personal information" on their own. On Oct. 10, the Defense Department was hit with a class action lawsuit seeking \$4.9 billion in damages and free credit monitoring services. That was followed by a suit against SAIC, filed on Oct. 26, that also seeks \$4.9 billion in damages and free credit monitoring services.

TRICARE in a statement last Friday maintained its position that the risk to any individual's personal data is minimal.

"There is no evidence that any of the data has actually been accessed by a third party, and analysis shows the chance any data was actually compromised is low," the military health care program said.

Army Brig. Gen. W. Bryan Gamble, deputy director of the TRICARE Management Activity said, "We take this

incident very seriously," and as a result directed SAIC provide one year of credit monitoring to patients who want it. SAIC will also analyze all available data to help TMA determine if identity theft occurs due to the data breach, Gamble said. (NOTE: Concerned patients may contact the SAIC Incident Response Call Center, Monday through Friday, 9 a.m. to 6 p.m. Eastern Time, at (855) 366-0140 (toll free) for United States callers and (952) 556-8312 (collect) internationally.) This could hit SAIC with a hefty bill if all 4.9 million beneficiaries whose data was on the stolen tapes ask for credit monitoring. When the Veterans Affairs Department experiences a loss, theft or exposure of this kind, it routinely offers credit monitoring services and up to \$1 million annually in identity theft protection at a cost per veteran of \$29.95 a year. If SAIC provided such monitoring and protection at the same rate, it would cost \$146.8 million to cover 4.9 million people. Filings in the class action lawsuit against Defense over the TRICARE data theft show that the Justice Department initially has tapped a high-profile attorney, Paul Freeborne, who handled the government's losing defense in a lawsuit against the military's "don't ask, don't tell" policy brought by the Log Cabin Republicans, a gay Republican group. Richard Coffman, the Beaumont, Texas, lawyer who filed the class action suit against SAIC, said he does not expect a reply from the company until the end of November.
